Retaining Membership

In our last article, I focused on reclaiming inactive members. This month I want to address "Retaining" *active* members. This should be a concern in all chapters due to COVID limitations. Retaining membership has always been a factor, however, it has never been more demanding than during this pandemic.

Membership retention is essential to the success of your chapter. Retaining the members, you currently have is far more beneficial than recruitment of new members. Chapters will find that sometimes it is somewhat of a tedious job to convince new members to join, however, keeping your current members engaged is far more rewarding and easier to accomplish. It is incumbent upon

chapter members to make your meetings enjoyable, informational, engaging, and worthwhile if you want your members to stick around. Acquiring new members is essential to healthy chapter growth, but if you are unable to keep them, your efforts will go unrewarded.

Here are five useful tips to retaining the members you have.

1. BENEFITS OF MEMBERSHIP

When individuals join organizations, they are looking for something to fill a void. Always remind your members of the benefits of membership in NSPSK.

2. COMMUNICATION

Members should always feel free to provide input. Communication is vital to a healthy environment. Good or bad, members should be heard and not shut down. Lack of input is one of the main reasons members stop coming. When a member doesn't feel free to speak, they will soon conclude their input is not valuable to the business of the chapter.

3. STAY IN TOUCH

Recognize a member's lack of involvement or absence from activities and meetings. A simple telephone call to check on them is a start. Offer to share a ride to meetings or events. Ask a member to share their expertise when planning activities and events.

4. RECOGNIZE MEMBERS

Although most people will not admit to it, people love to be patted on the back for the work they do. Recognize their contributions at every opportunity. You cannot over do this. Retaining a member begins the day they become a member. Come up with creative ways to say, "thank you" or "I see what you did". A simple thank you note says more than you could ever imagine. Recognize milestones, such as: 5, 10, and 15 years of membership. Make it a big deal for 25- and 50-year members. Have small inexpensive gifts or certificates for recognitions.

5. GET MEMBERS INVOLVED

There is always much work to be done. Have chapter members sign their name under one of the Y.E.S. initiatives. Create other involvement opportunities: refreshment chair, door monitor, newsletter, benevolence, MPP Monthly note, technology, and others.

In conclusion, your chapter will grow if you keep what you have. Don't forget, every member is important to the growth of your chapter. It's easier to keep what you have, than to replace what you lost.

Parliamentarian's Corner

Helping the Presiding Officer to Expedite Business

If you want to shorten your business meeting and make it as efficient as possible, do the following things.

- Be on time, so that the Presiding Officer can begin on time.
- Pay attention. Address all of your remarks to the chair. No side bar conversation.
- In making motions, after you have been recognized by the chair, begin with the words, "I move". Do not say, "I make a motion" or "I so move."
- Participate. Discuss Motions. Voice your ideas. Say what you think about a motion so members can vote intelligently.
- Be able to speak to the motion which you make.
- Talk loudly enough so that the chair will not have to repeat your words.
- Discuss only the immediately pending question. Do not introduce other topics.
- Vote for or against motions. Take an interest in what is happening.
- Know what you are voting on. Rise to a point of information and ask questions if you do not understand the motion.
- Move to limit debate if there is too much discussion.
- Stop debate by moving the previous question if discussion becomes repetitious and the time is short.
- If you think something is being done incorrectly, say, "I rise to a point of order" or I rise to a point of information". These motions may interrupt anyone and do not require recognition nor a second. A point of order must be raised at the time the violation occurs.


