What Soror Sylvia finds most rewarding about being a member of lota Chapter is the fellowship. "I really enjoy that - bouncing ideas off each other, watching the chapter grow and the youth too, – watching them grow.

It's so therapeutic. During the pandemic they was a yarn shortage and to this day they haven't replenished the particular yarn she used.

What many people may not know about Soror Sylvia is, "My son, Martin Jr. and I met Coretta Scott King when she presented at Stockton University in the early 2000's. There were 500 people there and they weren't doing interviews. What they asked the audience to do was to write any questions they had for Mrs. King on an index card and they vetted the questions. Martin's question was selected, and he was invited to the stage. He got to personally meet Mrs. Coretta Scott King. ask her some questions and get a hug and a kiss. His question was, 'Can I come up on the stage and give you a hug and a kiss?' Mrs. King said, "of

course you can, because that was my husband's name." Mrs. King also autographed a pamphlet from the King Center to Martin. Since her passing, the King Center has asked if they can have it for their artifacts. The African American Museum in Atlantic City has asked if they can have it too, but the Stephens family just can't part with it." Soror Sylvia still has the picture and the other memorabilia.
